

# The American Crisis of Inequality: Election 2012 in Historical Context

The tax and regulatory policies that have created this crisis of inequality are at the center of the American politics and provide the essential context for understanding the election of 2012.

## The Origins of the Tea Party Movement

The roots of the Tea Party lie in the far right conservative politics of the Cold War, which have reemerged with renewed force within the present crisis of American and global political economy.

Together with Dr. Martina Kohl, U.S. Embassy, and Dr. Stefan Heumann, U.S. Consulate Hamburg, he will briefly discuss the school project as a work in progress as well.

#### **CHARLES POSTEL**

is an award-winning historian of American political thought and society. He is the author of *The Populist Vision* (2007), a history of the original Populist movement of the 1890s, which received the Bancroft Prize in History and the Frederick Jackson Turner Award from the Organization of American Historians, two of the most prestigious prizes in the historical profession. His new book project is *Pursuit of Reform, 1865-1920*, a new interpretative work on the post-Civil War reform movements that culminated in the Progressive Era. He is also researching the historical origins of the Tea Party movement.

Dr. Postel earned both his B.A. in history (1995) and his Ph.D. in history (2002) from the University of California, Berkeley. He is an associate professor of History at San Francisco State University and has also taught at California State University, Sacramento, and at the University of California, Berkeley. At the moment, Dr. Postel is the Ghaemian Scholar-in-Residence at the Heidelberg Center for American Studies.


#### **CHRISTIANNA STAVROUDIS**

is an American lecturer in English language and linguistics at the Institute for British and North American Studies at the University of Greifswald. She holds a B.A. in Applied Linguistics from the University of Maryland-Baltimore County (USA) and an M.Sc. in Clinical Linguistics from the University of Potsdam. This past semester, she taught a course for first-semester students entitled *Reading American Politics: An Intercultural Perspective*, which focused on understanding U.S. government and U.S. domestic, foreign, and social issues relevant for the 2012 presidential elections. She is currently writing her dissertation within the field of language politics.

#### **TORBEN SCHMIDT**

is a professor at Leuphania University Lueneburg and expert on teaching English as a Foreign Language and the use of social media in the classroom. Dr. Schmidt received his teaching degree (state exam) in Mathematics and English from Gießen University in 2002 and his PhD from Frankfurt University in 2007. In 2010, he served as guest professor at Saint Mary's University in Halifax (Canada). Dr. Schmidt was granted several prestigious research and teaching fellowships as part of the Excellency Initiative of the German government.
