11:15 – 12:30 "Mash-Ups, Remixes, and Hybrids: The New American Literature", Lecture by Tony Magagna In his lecture, Dr. Tony Magagna will highlight the trend among contemporary American writers to bend, break, or simply ignore many traditional literary "boundaries". He will discuss how, amid the pervasive social, cultural, and technological diversity of the global era, American writers have increasingly blurred the edges of genre, form, and canon to craft a new American literature that challenges what we define as both "literature" and "American".

13:30 – 14:30 "Humanizing the 'So-Called Enemy': Teaching the Poetry of Naomi Shihab Nye", Workshop with Patricia Bloem

In a practical application of her lecture, Dr. Bloem will introduce the poetry of Naomi Shihab Nye, a Palestinian-American poet for children, young adults, and adults. Throughout the interactive session, teachers will read texts, discuss them in small groups, try out various teaching strategies, and engage in a brief Readers' Theatre.

15:00 – 16:00 "Teaching the New American Literature", Workshop with Tony Magagna In this workshop, we will discuss texts that represent the shifts in contemporary American literature that might be introduced into your classrooms. Whether using graphic novels to teach the English language alongside aspects of American culture, or reading stories that emphasize the impact of media and technology (as well as global culture) on American life, such texts can be powerful tools to engage student interests. In addition, we will explore ways in which non-traditional forms of literature and analysis - such as using Twitter or Facebook - might be used successfully in the classroom to convey lessons on literary analysis to a new generation of students.

Dr. Patricia L. Bloem



is Professor of English at Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Michigan. She has published many articles on teaching and is co-author of *The Writer's Community* and co-editor of *Ideas without Boundaries: International education reform through reading and writing for critical thinking.* Her current research focuses on international children's and young adult literature and how our students and teachers learn from the experience of reading these texts.

Dr. Tony R. Magagna



is currently the Fulbright Lecturer in American Studies at Potsdam University. In the United States, he serves as Assistant Professor of English at Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois. He grew up in Southwest Wyoming and earned his undergraduate degree at the University of Wyoming. In 2008, he completed his Ph.D. in English at the University of California-Davis, where he focused his research on modern and contemporary American literature, specializing in the literature and culture of the American West and in issues of space, place, and region in American literature. He has published several articles in the field and is currently at work on a book manuscript based on his dissertation, entitled *Placing the West: Landscape, Literature, and Identity in the American West.* While in Germany, Dr. Magagna is teaching a variety of courses, including courses on the contemporary literatures of California and the American West, Native American literature, modern American drama, and contemporary American regionalism.










Location
